mascot who will represent active and sustainable travel to and from schools in the region.

For your interest a summary of the School Travel Plan programme is included below.

A school does not need to have a travel plan in order to take part in the competition!

What is a travel plan?

A School Travel Plan is a set of practical actions which is developed and implemented by the whole school community in partnership with the local council and Greater Wellington.

Why school travel plans?

A School Travel Plan enables the whole school community to create a safe and healthy way for students to journey to and from school.

A School Travel Plan can help:

- Improve health and wellbeing
- Reduce traffic congestion
- Increase children's travel options
- Improve road and personal safety skills
- Support children to develop confidence and independence
- Reduce pollution in our environment
- Enhance local communities

What help is available?

A School Travel Plan Coordinator is available to help you develop your travel plan. Assistance can also come from:

- Police education officers
- Road safety co-ordinators
- Health providers
- Environmental educators
- Other relevant agencies

Schools involved in the School Travel Plan process will receive:

- Funding for teacher release time
- Funding for implementing the plan
- Resources to assist in developing the plan

Travel Plan Phases

An effective travel plan process includes the following phases:

- 1. Set up initial discussions and commitment from school
- 2. Data Collection travel methods and issues gathered from students and parents
- 3. Action Planning school community develops aims and strategies
- 4. Implementation official plan launch and actions carried out
- 5. Monitoring re-surveying and evaluation

What actions might we see?

Each school's travel plan is unique. Some actions which school communities have selected include:

Walking and cycling initiatives

Walk to school days, walking routes, walking school buses, cyclist skills training, cycle clubs and activity days

• Education

Road safety education programmes and initiatives and environmental education

• Promotion

Newsletters, poster campaigns, competitions, rewards and awards schemes

Enforcement

Marking and speeding monitoring and enforcement strategies

• Engineering

Assessment of infrastructure issues identified through the school travel plan, pedestrian crossings, cycling facilities, road markings and signage, etc.
